acerage owned by them is 795,245 acres.

As the slash area in Coo's County is becoming

greater each year, it becomes necessary (so far as the funds will permit) to increase the number of patrolmen, and accordingly, we had to call for the full assessment of one cent per acre this year.

At this time there are no lands of the members of the Association under purchase agreement to the Federal Government to be taken over by the Government this year, so that the acreage to be assessed another season will be approximately the same as this season.

Fire Season

The fire season of 1922 began early in May and was quite dry until nearly the end of the month, making it necessary to put on the patrolmen about the tenth of the month, but about the end of May rain began, and the rest of the season there was very little danger of forest fires.

One might dispute the above assertion after having read the forest fire record of the past twelve years and comparing the years with the report of 1922, but as I have to get this record from the State Forester's Office each year, and that on account of the Forestry Commission changing the end of the fiscal year from the 31st of August to the 30th of June, it will be readily seen that two months of the dry season of 1921 are included in the report of fires for this year.

Patrol

Twenty patrolmen were employed during the entire season, the others only during the early season, and when fishermen were on the streams in large numbers. Seventeen small fires were put out by the patrolmen, and 3,589 persons warned by them to be careful of fire while in the woods. The following is the list of Patrol courses for this season:

As in past years, No.'s 6, 7, and 8 were paid jointly by this Association and the State of Maine Forestry Commission.

In sixteen towns in which the Association members have holdings, there occurred twenty-two fires, the total acreage burned being 635 acres, in the other twenty-nine towns no fires were reported.
