The total acreage of the Association which was under protection in 1951 was 604,882 acres.

# REPORT Season of 1951

The past season was an unusually successful one for the Association even though the acreage burned was in access of the previous year. The large amount of rainfall and the effective control program again proved that this method of fire prevention and suppression is extremely worthwhile and efficient.

During the past season we attempted to utilize the patrolmen during the wet periods, and when there was little fire danger in opening up many of the old trails and logging roads. This work is worthwhile and should be expanded to a much greater extent this next season, if time is available, for the reason that it makes these outlying areas very much more accessible for patrol, and in the event of a fire it would facilitate very greatly the bringing in of men and equipment.

The Association continues to function in a (3).

very serviceable manner. Our relationships with the State of New Hampshire and the Town Fire Officials are ideal, and I believe we are cooperating to the fullest extent possible in preventing and suppressing fires. Our records indicate that our own patrolmen suppressed many small fires during the course of their travels which might have been serious if they had not been put out at the start.

The landowners, however, have the responsibility of carrying the prevention work much further than the Association as an Agency will ever be able to do. Many of the landowners are producing forest products, and these woods workers must be fully and completely informed as to the dangers which are likely to occur, particularly during hazardous periods. Suitable tools must be available during the period in which the ban is in effect, and during these periods, when the landowners are permitted to operate, unusual vigilance must be exercised in order that we fully meet our responsibilities to the towns and the State.

The Association operated this past season

again on the basis of 1½c per acre per year. The officials will make every effort to operate the Association again as economically as is possible, keeping in mind, however, that its principal function is to carry on an effective forest fire prevention program.
